Use a wide range of phrases that include determiners, modifiers and other techniques to add extra interest and clarity. Vary the length and structure of a range of spoken and written accounts. Comment on the grammatical structure of a range of spoken and written accounts. Narrate detailed and exciting stories. Use the conventions and structure appropriate to the type of story being told. Interweave action, character descriptions, settings and dialogue. Negotiate and compromise by offering alternatives. Debate, using relevant details to support points. Offer alternative explanations when others don't understand.
