Children working within Year 1 expectations should be in Yellow group by the end of the Year 1 and should meet the expected standard in the Phonic Screening Check. Children who are below ARE receive daily Phonics Tuition.

Pupils should be taught to: ➤ spell: • words containing each of the 40+ phonemes already taught • common exception words • the days of the week ➤ name the letters of the alphabet: • naming the letters of the alphabet in order • using letter names to distinguish between alternative spellings of the same sound ➤ add prefixes and suffixes: • using the spelling rule for adding -s or -es as the plural marker for nouns and the third person singular marker for verbs • using the prefix un- • using -ing, -ed, -er and -est where no change is needed in the spelling of root words [for example, helping, helped, helper, eating, quicker, quickest] ➤ apply simple spelling rules and guidance, as listed in English Appendix 1 ➤ write from memory simple sentences dictated by the teacher that include words using the GPCs and common exception words taught so far.						Pupils should be taught to: • sit correctly at a table, holding a pencil comfortably and correctly • begin to form lower-case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place • form capital letters • form digits 0-9 • understand which letters belong to which handwriting 'families' (i.e. letters that are formed in similar ways) and to practise these.
